For the past ten months the Board of Directors has embarked on a three phase approach in planning for the 2017 Convention. I am pleased to announce that phase one and two are complete.

Phase one, the selection of the host city, was straight forward. Norfolk VA was an easy choice. It is located within a fifty mile radius of both Historic Williamsburg and Jamestown and has many historic sites located within the city limits including the battleship Missouri. Last, but certainly not least, it is the home of the Chrysler Museum of Art. The museum's collection of glass is one of the most noted in the world. In addition to Tiffany and Webb cameo glass, the museum has over two hundred paperweights most of which will be on view during the convention. Additionally the museum houses an extensive collection of Decorative Arts.

Phase two, the selection of the host hotel, proved to be more difficult. Two hotels were in contention. We finally

chose the Norfolk Waterside Marriott Hotel and Convention Center. The hotel is located in the downtown historic district and we were able to negotiate a favorable room rate. The rate including Wi-Fi will be \$130 per night. Most important the convention itself will occupy the entire third floor of the convention center. This will provide the PCA with office space, auditorium and exhibit space within a compact area.

Phase three, the assembling of the convention program, is ongoing. A visit to the museum will be included in the program. The museum has a hot shop and we are contemplating the use of its facilities as part of the program. All suggestion for the program will be gratefully accepted.

Now one may ask why I have titled this article "It Is Your Turn". I have outlined what the Board has and continues to do for the 2017 Convention. Now it is your turn to participate. Paperweight Fest 2016

Paperweight Fest 2016, presented by WheatonArts in association with the Delaware Valley Paperweight Collectors Association, will be held May 12-14. The theme of this year's Fest is "All in the Family," a celebration of the work of paperweight artist families featuring the artistry of Ray Banford and Bob Banford . A display of their work will be presented in the Museum of American Glass. Other displays include an exhibit of past collector/artist collaborative paperweights and a pansy contest run by Jim Lefever.

On Thursday, the first day of the Fest, registrants will have the opportunity to make their own paperweight in the Glass Studio from several WheatonArts designs. In addition, they can opt for a one-on-one collaborative experience with a contemporary artist (millefiori design with Jim Brown or Damon MacNaught, or lampworking with Melissa Ayotte or David Graeber). Other events include an optional cruise on the Maurice River in the afternoon, and the opening of the Artists and Dealers fairs in the evening.

Events on Friday include the start of the pansy identification contest, presentations by John Hawley, Gay LeCleire Taylor, and Ed Poore, two "Meet the Artists" sessions, collaborative demonstrations and auction in the Glass Studio, the Dealers Fair, and a reception in the Museum of American Glass.

Saturday continues the busy schedule with presentations by Ben Drabeck and Charles Kaziun III, an "All in the Family" panel discussion with Rick and Melissa Ayotte (artists), Alan Kaplan and Susie Jacobson (dealers), and John and Toby Hawley (collectors), and the results of the pansy contest with Jim Lefever. The afternoon includes the final "Meet the Artist" session, the dealers fair, and the last collaborative demonstration and auction. A banquet rounds out the Fest that evening.
